

From the Minister

or five Tuesdays leading up to Holy Week,
Churches Together in Beckenham have run a
Lent Group. There were 4 courses to choose from (our own Chris McShane led an Art course) and the one I chose was called Keeping the Earth. The content included many truly terrifying facts and statistics about



climate change (which the course leaders referred to as the Breakdown) and we were encouraged to think about ways in which individuals can play their part in combating it.

But all through everything was linked to the Bible, to the Gospel of Jesus Christ and to our responsibility as his disciples. We were also repeatedly reminded of Jesus' gospel of justice for all: the people in our world who will be most affected by climate change are the ones who are most innocent of having created it. Social justice demands that the developed nations should make reparation to the innocent nations whose way of life and indeed whose very land is being put under threat by their actions.

What struck me repeatedly was a graphic the leaders used which, to simplify considerably, showed the


progression from the Creation, through the incarnation, crucifixion and resurrection of Christ, to the New Creation.

Before the incarnation of Christ, we have Isaiah 65: 17-25 (sometimes known as the Isaiah Vision) which talks of the New Order, a new creation where justice and harmony triumph. The new order centres on the Lord as the great king in his holiness and glory, and on his people experiencing God's comfort, salvation, righteousness, peace, divine blessing and protection.

After the coming of Christ, we know as Christians that the resurrection has brought the kingdom of God to earth and that we have been reborn with Christ into the new creation. Our course leaders focused on Romans 8 and particularly on verses 21-22; "With eager hope the creation looks forward to the day when it will join God's children in glorious freedom from death and decay." And this reminds us that the new life gifted to us by Jesus isn't just for us. It is for all creation and Paul makes that clear. It is for us as Easter people, as the followers of Jesus Christ who have asked for his redemption and been given it as a gift of grace, to take responsibility for God's creation and to do all we can in our individual lives to look after his world.

So, as we experience once again the joy of Easter, as our hearts overflow with thankfulness to God for his great gift of grace, as we triumph over the victory of the cross and, above all, as we reflect on all that the resurrection means for us as Christians, let us remember that joy and triumph, wonder and

thankfulness are not all that is required of us. The resurrection shows us what was achieved on the cross and invites all who love Jesus into his new creation, into the new life of the kingdom of God. But, amid all the joy, let us not forget what St Paul says about the whole creation looking forward to joining God's children in glorious freedom from death and decay; let us not forget that the right to be the children of God brings with it the responsibility to look after his creation and work for it.

od sent his son to sacrifice himself on the cross so that all who believe in him may become children of God and live in the kingdom of God, brought to earth. This act of incredible grace put right all that had gone wrong with creation when Adam and Eve disobeyed God. So the resurrection of Jesus ushered in a new creation to replace the old one. In April our Sunday service theme will be A New Creation.

Hymns and Songs of Praise

f my memory serves me right it was in 1987 that the BBC TV programme SONGS OF PRAISE centred on **ST. CHRISTOPHER'S HOSPICE** and was filmed at St. George's, Beckenham. (Somewhere I have a video tape of it but I fear it would (a) take me ages to find it and (b) it might self-destruct if we tried to have it converted to a DVD)!

That was the service where I first became aware of the hymn which begins "O worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness!" (J.S.B.Monsell*, 1811 - 75). I have loved it ever since and its words "mornings of joy give for evenings of tearfulness" resound with me when I think back to the anguish of our youngest son's encounter with meningitis at only 5 months and the hopeless tears we shed seeing him suffer in an isolation ward for 3 weeks. Our special mornings of joy were the day 32 years later when he wed his deaf bride and then a year later when their beloved daughter was born.

In between, the hymn's words "Low at his feet lay thy burden of carefulness, High on his heart he will bear it for thee, Comfort thy sorrows, and answer thy prayerfulness,

Comfort thy sorrows, and answer thy prayerfulness, Guiding thy steps as may best for thee be" were on my mind when we apprehensively took him to **Great**

Ormond Street Hospital at 15 years for a cochlear implant operation at his own request.

Suffice it to say, as I see the number on the hymn board or catch the opening music, my eyes are never dry by the time it ends and yet my heart is full of thankfulness.

He died on the 9th April, 1875, and is buried in Guildford Cemetery, Guildford, Surrey.




