

A Train Journey at Pentecost

from the sermon delivered by Chris Parker

on Sunday, 20th May

Before reading the article below, I want you to imagine that you are catching a train.



What emotions do you have as you set out from the front door of your house?

Now listen to this 3 year old's account.

"Grandma. Come on! We will be late and miss the train. Hurry! Grandma".

Caleb pulls at her hand eager to get things moving. "Have you got your ticket Grandma"? They walk on down towards the station with Caleb constantly tugging her hand to make quicker progress. They enter the platform and the regular adult commuters are standing around with their heads in their mobile phones, or a book, taking no interest in what's happening around them. They look bored.

Caleb is far from bored. He is waiting for the train in the very best spirit of waiting. His eyes are virtually popping out of his head. He's jigging up and down with excitement, so much so that Grandma asks if he needs the toilet.

No, his focus is the approaching loco.

He says, "Here it comes Grandma"...

"Look how close it is to us". Oh, my goodness. His mouth wide open when the train finally rolls into the station.

"Did you feel the rush of that wind as it went past us, Grandma?"

He is full of awe and wonder, and his enthusiasm not only makes you smile, but draws you into the array of emotions he is feeling.

These first moments, first experiences, in anyone's life are precious, and they become etched into our memories as significant events in our life; but as we grow older, we sometimes forget how amazing these things were, and it can be the same in our faith.

As Christians, we all remember to celebrate **Christmas** and **Easter**, and society will go all out commercially to promote these two events in the Christian calendar with advertising those 'must have' presents and sugary eggs and bunnies.

But, whoever saw the shop windows decked with flames of fire or tongues made of chocolate? This Pentecost Day should be as important and as exciting as Christmas and Easter!

Remember the day you asked **Jesus** into your life and then waited in the anticipation of **being filled with the**

Holy Spirit?

Have you considered the Psalms?

I have the dubious privilege of having to say the Psalms every day as part of Morning and Evening Prayer.

I only say 'dubious' because sometimes it is hard - I am feeling lost, or miserable, or hurt, or just plain bored.

What was the phrase I picked up during Confirmation preparation (many years ago) about saying prayers with a dull, dry, disinterested spirit? (I have forgotten the exact words)

But I press on and, more often than not, when I turn to the psalm/s for the day, I will find one of the following:

How long, Lord, will you utterly forget me, how long will you hide your face from me?

Psalm 13

My God, My God, why have you forsaken me, and are so far from my salvation, and from the words of my crying? I call out by day, and you do not answer, by night and I find no rest.

Psalm 22

Save me, O God, for the waters come in up to my soul... I have no foot hold

Psalm 69

And reading on, I realise I am not alone in my misery, fear or hurt.

The psalms were written somewhere between 1000 BC (when David was king) and 400 BC.; so many years before Jesus was born. Yet Jesus knew the psalms well and quoted them.

Some of the psalms are full of faith and thankfulness:

Lord, you have been my refuge, from one generation to another...a thousand years in your sight are but as yesterday; they pass like a watch of the night. *Psalm 90*

It is good to give thanks to the Lord, and to make music to your name, O God Most High.

Psalm 92

(Yes, the psalms were written to be sung)

Other psalms were written in awe and wonder:

The Lord is king! The peoples tremble: he has taken his seat above the cherubim, the earth is shaking.

The Heavens are telling the glory of God Psalm 19

The psalms, though written so long ago, cover every emotion that humans can experience - from fear, violent anger, joy, faith, abandonment, wonder and more..

Still others tell us to "wait upon God" - and instead of telling God what we want Him to do - how about listening in the silence for His voice - maybe using the words of Psalm 40

I waited patiently for the Lord; and He inclined to me and heard my cry.

Or hear about the wonder of 'Stillness' in Psalm 62:

For God alone my soul in silence waits; from him comes my salvation. He alone is my rock and my salvation...

Cubs have completed lots of badges, including first aid, cycling, pioneering, the Coronation, backwoods cooking, global issues, world faith, naturalist, environmental conservation, digital maker, digital citizen, disability, communicator, as well as several of their Challenge badges - World, Teamwork, Adventure, and Outdoor. They visited Cator Park and invited guests such as a British sign language tutor, and a local paramedic.

They created a Code of Conduct, studied fair trade, food poverty, mental health, global warming, and bird

and butterfly identification. They made bird feeders and mini wind turbines, and two Cubs achieved the highest award available in this section - the Chief Scout's Silver Award.

Scouts

e welcomed a new Sectional Assistant, Cleo, who has been helping at several activities and events. Badges completed include environmental conservation, geocaching, athletics, fire safety, scientist, cycling, DIY, and emergency aid, as well as the Expedition Challenge. They had a joint summer camp with 1st Beckenham South Troop at Tolmer's Activity Centre in Hertfordshire, cooking all their own food, where activities included archery. aeroball, tunnels, air rifles, dash & grab, rock-climbing, and quoits. Invited guests included Winnie from SE20 Cycles, and a mental health & wellbeing coach, and they put on a talent show. They visited Bromley Games Workshop to play Warhammer, completed a Remembrance Day hike from Crystal Palace to Bromley, visiting 7 war memorials en route. They took part in the District Swimming Gala at Beckenham Spa and dragon boating at London Docks. They went on a chip shop hike around Penge, an Easter Egg hunt in Cator Park, and helped plant the Tiny Forest in Cator Park, as well as taking part in the Monopoly Live Run, around the streets of central London. One Scout achieved the highest possible award available in this section - the Chief Scout's Gold Award.

All sections attended a very wet and muddy St George's Day event at Fryland's Wood Campsite, but thoroughly enjoyed a selection of nearly fifty different activities. All sections also attended Group Camp, with the Beavers attending for the Saturday, but Cubs and Scouts camped for two nights at Broadstone Warren Campsite, enjoying abseiling, crate-stacking, tunnels, zipwire and a traditional campfire singsong. All sections attended a cold and wet Halloween Spooktacular activity day at Cudham Shaw's Campsite. All sections attended the Remembrance Day Service at the Penge War Memorial, and the pantomime Aladdin in Churchfields Halls.


